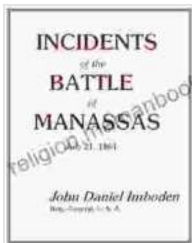

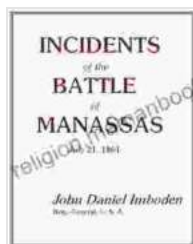


Painting depicting the Battle of Manassas, July 21, 1861.

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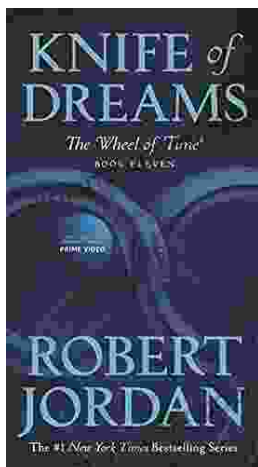


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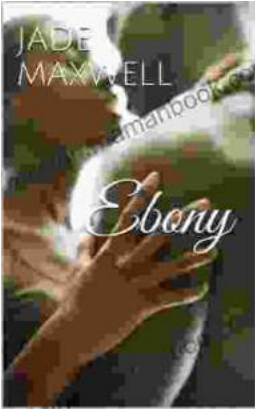
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
